

# Chapter 1: Tense Foundations

*The foundation of English fluency lies in the mastery of verb tenses. In this chapter, we focus on the distinction between the Simple Present (habits, facts) and the Present Continuous (actions in progress).*

## **Practice Exercises:**

1. Conjugate the following verbs in the Simple Present and Present Continuous: to work, to study, to sleep.
2. Identify the errors in this paragraph: 'He go to the store every day, but today he is go to the park.'
3. Write a 5-sentence paragraph describing your daily routine using both tenses.

# Chapter 2: Modal Auxiliaries

*Modals like 'can', 'could', 'must', and 'should' add nuance to your speech, expressing ability, necessity, or advice.*
